Dear Church Family,

As we once again made the shift, and I believe rightfully so, from gathering in person in our church buildings for worship, study, fellowship and mission to having to connect in alternate ways with one another, many of us are feeling alone, isolated, and frustrated. Not all of us are easily able to connect virtually, and when we do, it certainly doesn't feel the same. We are sick and tired of the words "social distance" and just want this stupid pandemic to be over. I am right there with you! But just because we've been encouraged to keep from gathering in person, we don't need to stop being the church and we don't have to be disconnected.

I am grateful for the ways we have been able to remain connected worshipping on our website, Facebook, You Tube, WIOE; through emails, phone calls and old fashioned mail; and grateful to those who have worked hard to keep us connected. That has been the amazing thing through all of this and the past almost 9 months....that we have been able to provide opportunities to remain connected as a church even though it has been challenging, different and unfamiliar.

Courtney Sale, our church's Youth Leader sent me an ABC 57 news article she read from an investigative report on the effects of the pandemic on mental health and the importance of connections. In the news segment, the writer highlighted how the pandemic has impacted our mental health and stressed the importance of recognizing signs our mental health is suffering in ourselves and others, finding alternate ways of staying connected, reaching out for help as needed and changing the language we use in this time of pandemic. It recommended rather than using "social distancing" we use "physical distancing" as a reminder that we do not need to be socially isolated and alone and that continuing to reach out to one another in other ways can be a critical lifeline.

Because of the importance of keeping the spread of the virus down for not only the safety of our families and ourselves, but also for our healthcare workers and communities I believe it is vital we maintain physical distance, but not social distance. Thanks to the advances in technology and the creativity of people who are willing to make needed adjustments, we can and must remain connected to one another as the Body of Christ. Rather than seeing our church as closed, I see it being untethered from the buildings reaching out to our church family and into our community in many different ways.

During Advent, we will have the opportunity to be connected through not only worship services on our "virtual" platforms, but also in small groups via Zoom, a tool being used by many to stay connected online as well as on the telephone. Dave Heim will lead a four-week Advent study on Wednesday nights 7pm beginning December 2nd entitled Incarnation based upon the Adam Hamilton book by that title. I will continue to offer Bible study on Thursdays at 8am (men's Bible study) and Thursday evenings 7pm (everyone Bible study) via Zoom. If you have questions regarding how to join either by internet or by phone to a Zoom meeting, please let me know. Our communications director, Mandy Ferguson, is working on making training available to anyone interested in learning more about how to connect virtually as well. And then there is the old-fashioned ways of connecting virtually through a phone call or a note of encouragement. If someone comes to mind, give them a call or send them a note of encouragement.

We will get through this! The church will still have a mission to fulfill of making disciples of Jesus and a community to love. Church looks a little different as we wade through this and it is important that we are open to the Spirit's leading to discover new ways of reaching out and connecting. I believe we can come out stronger and better on the other side. We are learning a lot about ourselves, about life, about God as we walk through this together in spite of the challenges. So, while we are being asked to maintain physical distance, God continues to call us to make disciples of Jesus, grow as his disciples and to love one another.

The new services are posted at 9:00 a.m. on Sundays. The services for that week will remain on the website until the next Sunday at 9:00 a.m. when the new one is posted. To re-visit past services, go to our YouTube page (Warsaw FUMC) and all of the past services are saved there. On YouTube you can like our videos (thumbs up) and click the Subscribe button to receive notifications when we post a new video. To connect with others, join our Facebook Warsaw FUMC Group (link on our Facebook page) so you can join in conversations, prayer requests, and praises with those you

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miss seeing in the next pew. You can also listen to the service on the radio at 101.1 WIOE at 9:00 a.m. on Sundays.


2021 1st Quarter Mission Focus . . . Bashor Children's Home








Community Closet Advent Calendar

From Janet Kirkpatrick, Church Historian:

This summer I discovered an amazing bit of history from our church. I had just finished framing the pictures of our former pastors to be displayed in the hallway in the downtown church. A few of the photos were obviously copies of pictures published in the local newspaper, and as a result, their quality was not the best. I got the idea to search the internet and my genealogy website to see if I could find any better depiction of those early pastors. One of those early pastors was Commodore Perry Gibbs, who was at the Warsaw Methodist Episcopal Church from 1929 to 1932. My search did not find a better picture of him, but it did uncover a manuscript that he had written entitled "My Old Kentucky Home". The work was a reproduction described as "being culturally important and ... part of the knowledge base of civilization as we know it." My curiosity was peeked; then suddenly I remembered something my mother had told me about her experience at church. She fondly remembered a pastor who told stories about his 'Old Kentucky Home'. He had apparently made quite an impression on Mother, who at that time was a young Indiana farm girl. Yes, that pastor was C. P. Gibbs.

In the downtown location you can find a copy of his manuscript about his home; his education, his religion and his advice to young and old. It is a small booklet and an easy read. When time permits, come to the parlor and experience Pastor Gibb's message.
